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## Rector's Letter October/November 2014

Dear Friends

Take a trip down to see the Scottish Parliament in action and you might just be rewarded by sight of the mace which was presented by Her Majesty the Queen at the opening ceremony of the Scottish Parliament, 1 July 1999. On it the founding of the Scottish Parliament is commemorated by the words 'There shall be a Scottish Parliament - The Scotland Act 1998'

Designed and crafted by Michael Lloyd, it is made from silver and of gold panned from Scottish rivers, with the inlaid gold band symbolising the relationship between the Parliament, its people and the land. Engraved on the head of the mace are the words 'Wisdom, Justice, Compassion and Integrity' - these are a reference to the ideals that the people of Scotland aspire to for their Members of Parliament.

As Scotland moves forward into the future following the referendum, it seems to me more and more that the qualities we need to find in ourselves and our leaders are precisely those of 'Wisdom, Justice, Compassion and Integrity', along with a healthy dose of courage. The temptation to find and adopt policies which suit only part of our society will be strong, leaving behind those who have had little or no voice. One of the key ways we can measure a country's maturity is to look at how it treats its poorest members – how will Scotland fare in this regard in the months and years to come?

St Peter's, like all the church communities of whatever denomination in Scotland, has an important contribution to make in ensuring that Christian values come to the fore in the new Scotland. We will speak out for them verbally but equally so when it comes to being an example of loving, sacrificial Christian service in our local community.

For example, in the coming weeks you will have a chance to comment on and after discussion endorse plans to renew our church buildings. As we play our part in this process as members of the congregation, let's remember our calling to place alongside our own need for new

halls, new toilets, new kitchen facilities and disabled access the need to make these features freely available for members of our local community also.

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## Wilfred Owen Violin

Steve Burnett, who has been tuning St Peter's pianos for many years, has recently completed the production of a violin in commemoration of the Great War. It has been named the 'Wilfred Owen Violin' after the poet Wilfred Owen who spent time recuperating from shell shock in the Craiglockhart War Hospital in Edinburgh.

The wood for the violin came from the branch of a sycamore tree growing in the grounds of the former hospital. The branch was removed as part of a routine pruning operation and the host tree is still living and growing.

Steve took 6 months to make the violin and crafted it from green, unseasoned wood using a combination of personal expertise and Italian renaissance techniques. The Wilfred Owen Violin received its first concert outing in the Queens Hall and was played by the Scottish violinist Feargus Hetherington.

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## Eulogy of Peggy Muir

To the girls of Malay Girls College she was the legendary Miss Butler, to the pupils of Mackie Academy in Stonehaven she was Ma Muir, to friends and family she was Peggy but to us she was mum.

Our little Mummy went to Malaysia after reading about it in a book. She had shared the family home in Northern Ireland with her brother and when he married she took the opportunity offered by her honours degree in Mathematics from Queens University Belfast to take up a post at the Malay Girls College which was, and remains, the leading Girls school in the country. This was in the mid 50's and she was brave and pioneering to travel across the equator to start a new life on her own.

In Malaysia she met our father - David - and they married in Penang on the 26/10/62 and I appeared a year later. Sorting through her affairs we have come upon cards, presents and other tokens that showed the love they had for each other. After an extended honeymoon caravanning through Europe we settled briefly in London to make Cathy a cockney before returning to the house in Fourth Avenue, Bangor. (I always thought that appropriate when she moved to Edinburgh until I visited it and found it next to Third Avenue and not Clyde avenue).

We moved to Germany for three years where the enjoyment of travelling though the country was somewhat marred by our fighting in the backseat of the car. She did bring up 2 children there, partly living in a caravan. Great for the children not so great for mum. Then on to Stonehaven where she resumed teaching and we joined the congregation of St James the Magnificent where Mum's ashes will join Dad's in rest.

After Dad's death in 1983 she moved to Edinburgh where Cathy & I

were both students and whilst staying in temporary accommodation, - coincidentally the three of us lived in the same block at different times, - she joined the congregation of St Peters and after moving to Greenbank stayed within it and involved herself with The Guild and the Monday Group. After having her pacemaker fitted in April she hoped to be able to once again attend services.

She also hoped to return to Tai Chi which she took up after her quadruple bypass despite never evincing a fondness for the films of Bruce Lee. She did like Crouching Tiger Hidden Dragon though and the friendships that went with the art, which in its pursuit of calmness suited Mum's character.

She loved living in Edinburgh which gave her access to the cultural life and the many friends that she shared these with.

Margaret Elizabeth had a sister Pat and a brother Dennis who both predeceased her, Pat at a young age sadly just after her parents. Besides her children Thomas and Catherine she was aunt and great aunt to many but sadly was never blessed with grandchildren, but she had a special bond with her great niece Alexandra who shared her birthday. She had a multitude of friends throughout the world with whom she often corresponded in their own language.

She was mentally alert and engaged until the end, enjoying the longer days of summer and the summer sports. She was disappointed that Scotsman Andy Murray didn't win at Wimbledon, but was thrilled that Northern Irish golfer Rory McIlroy won the Open, giving her support to both her homes.

Her passing was unexpected and we never got a chance to thank her properly for her presence in our lives that made us the people we are

today. Nor can we find out what book drew her to Malaysia all those years ago.

Whilst standing in this magnificent building where mum was part of the congregation for so many years and listening to the organ which she helped renew I am reminded that teachings and stories last millenia. I hope that you all will share your stories of our little mummy after this.

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## Harry and June Syme

The daughter of Harry and June is making a regular donation to church funds and has asked that this be in memory of her parents. They will each be remembered in our Years Mind at the appropriate time, but now is about the halfway mark of when they left us (Harry in April and June in December) and September or October would seem the right time to remember them as a couple.

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# Annual General Meeting of the Congregation

I give notice that the annual general meeting of the congregation will be held in the large hall on Sunday 26 October 2014 immediately following the close of the 10.45 am communion service at approximately 12 noon. All constituent members of the congregation may attend.

One of the items of business at this meeting will be the election of persons to serve on the Vestry. One member of the present Vestry are due to retire by rotation—Pam Dugan. Pam is eligible to stand again at this election. Fiona Marshall has also indicated her desire to step down from Vestry membership. Therefore, there are two vacancies to be filled.

Constituent members of the congregation are therefore invited to nominate eligible individuals for election to the vacancies. Constituent members are those members of the congregation whose names appear on the Roll of Communicants and who are aged 18 years and over.

Nominations must be in writing and signed by the proposer and a seconder (both of whom must be constituent members of the congregation). The nomination must state that the person proposed is a constituent member of the congregation and is willing to serve on the Vestry. The letters of nomination should be addressed to the Rector at:

and he must receive the nomination by noon on Saturday, 25 October 2014.

Nominations will not be accepted at the meeting.

In addition to the Vestry Elections the Meeting will have to elect a lay representative and an alternate lay representative. Janet Jenkins, our lay representative and Dan Docwra, our alternate lay representative are not willing to stand again. Nominations for these two posts (duly seconded) should be sent to the Rector and he must receive them by noon on 25 October.

Copies of the Report of the Vestry and the Annual Accounts will be available in advance of the AGM and, it is hoped, will be set out in church on the Sunday two weeks before the meeting. Please make sure that you pick up a copy (and bring it with you to the meeting). They will not be posted out.



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# Festival of Sacred Music



**Music is unique. It communicates with the whole person at different levels – with the intellect, the emotions, the senses, the body. It helps us to articulate our faith.**

After the buzz and dash of the other music festival in Edinburgh now comes a chance to take a measured journey that explores over 500 years of Christian and musical tradition. From **12 September 2014 to 26 April 2015**, Mayfield Salisbury Parish Church will be hosting its annual festival which this time develops the theme of Sacred Music. This festival of events explores and celebrates the glory of sacred music through concerts, lectures, workshops and worship.

The stimulating programme opens with a weekend of events including a concert of sacred choral works from mediaeval Scotland to the present day, performed by the Mayfield Singers and instrumental music from Caritas Strings from George Watson's College; a lecture by Professor Jo Wainwright whose subject deals with Music and Worship in England and Scotland in the 17<sup>th</sup> century – Living through Troubled Times; and worship, with a service of Holy Communion led by Minister, Chamber Group and Choir. These three elements set the pattern for the festival during its eight months' duration, with the addition of participative workshops on the Scottish Psalms and Afro-American Spirituals, plus events that explores family singing favourite hymns with older people.

An impressive list of eminent musicians, including John Butt, Gardner Professor of Music at Glasgow University, whose lecture on J.S.Bach will be followed by a performance of a Bach cantata given by the Mayfield Singers and Players; and Dr Jamie Reid-Baxter, historian, poet and performer whose lecture on Scottish church music up to the Reformation will be illustrated by Sang Scule the a cappella group. The festival will close with a concert of celebratory music by Handel.

At morning and evening worship throughout the Choir, Chamber Group and Organist will contribute special anthems and lead special services, particularly at Christmas and Easter. The music of other Christian traditions will also feature.

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# Sunday Services at St Peter's

## **8.30am Holy Communion**

This spoken Morning Prayer and Communion follow the 1929 Prayer Book. There is no music and, on the first Sunday of each month, there is no sermon.

## **10.45am: Sung Mattins**

Held in the Church with the choir and organ: This follows the 1929 Prayer Book, and sometimes includes a choral version of a Canticle.

## **10.45am: Hall Service**

An All-Age Communion service that is held in the hall. It is contemporary in style and music, uses a simple Liturgy and is led by an informal choir and instrumentalists.

## **10.45am 1982 Communion**

This Communion service follows the 1982 Liturgy, with choir and organ, and the congregational Communion Setting is by David Sanger, Noel Rawsthorne or David Jenkins (James MacMillan in Advent and Lent). Sunday's Cool is held during these services with the children leaving at different times depending on their age. Everyone returns in time for Communion.

## **10.45am 1970 Communion**

This Communion service follows the 1970 Liturgy, with choir and organ, and the Communion Setting is by Merbecke.

## **All Age Services**

All Age services follow a simple Liturgy and mix traditional with contemporary music using both the Organ and Instrumentalists as appropriate.

## **6.30pm Evening Services:**

**Compline** follows the 1929 Prayer Book.

**Choral Evensong** is a sung evening service that follows the 1929 Prayer Book
