November Vestry Update

Vestry members met on the 1st November online, following the in-person AGM on 29th October.

We welcomed Christian Anderson as a newly elected member and Lenore Simson for her second three-year term. We thanked Roddy Simson, the elected Lay Representative and welcomed Jan Sidaway's election as the Alternate Lay Representative.

We had updates on the Church Buildings:

Work on the Hall roof is nearly complete thankfully; despite and especially with the storms which have tested it!

They caused only minor flooding in the organ chamber, again testing the new drainage.

There remains the small area of dry rot in the Church roof, which will be next on the list.

Laura Bird, as treasurer, reported that she will be more able to give financial projections for this year's accounts (June 2023 -June 2024) at the January 2024 meeting.

Donald, asked by Nick to lead the small group for the recruitment of a new children's and youth worker, reported on their meeting. Until the worker arrives, Becky Wills and Rachel Petrie are arranging activities for children in the Hall or the Millar Chapel during part of the 10.45am service. We are grateful to them.

We noted Christian Wong's appointment as organ scholar and looked forward to his involvement.

The results of the discussion following the question raised at the AGM about the administration of Communion was reported in the November issue of News and Views. Our focus was considering welcoming children and others for whom alcohol was not appropriate. No changes would be made to the present arrangements.

Please continue to pray for your Vestry.

Our next Vestry meetings are scheduled for 6th December and 3rd January.

Hall Roof Update

With financial support from Valencia Communities Fund, Benefact Trust and St Peter's congregation our new hall roof is almost complete.

The scaffolding went up in late August and the tiny old Scotch slates were stripped off. Since then ventilation points were cut in, a breathable membrane laid and new large slates laid.

The original roof had space for a fan in the ridge although never seen in living memory. This has now been replaced with a new zinc and lead capped fleche (or spirelet) to house an extractor



fan. Although the windows were refurbished recently to open and close the extractor fan allows controlled air change without letting loads of cold air into the building. It also means that for noisier events stale air (and sound) can be extracted upwards instead of out at the neighbours.

The final bill has yet to be settled but has been made easier thanks to £25,000 from Valencia Communities Fund and £3,000 from Benefact Trust.



Mercy Ships, Christmas Charity

Our 2023 Christmas Charity will again be Mercy Ships.

One of our members, Phil Booth, is spending a second year working as an Engineer with Mercy Ships, a Christian charity that operates hospital ships. These bring lifechanging surgical and medical care to communities which would otherwise be without them, and where healthcare is very limited or sometimes non-existent.

With 44% of the population in Africa living within 100 miles of a coast, the most efficient way to bring a state-of-the-art hospital to thousands in need is by using their two ships, Global Mercy and Africa Mercy, Global Mercy being the largest charity-run hospital ship in the world. The two ships enable safe, affordable and timely access to health care and surgery to developing countries in Africa.

Eco-Matters

Emails and their Environmental Impact

We send billions of emails daily, and their environmental impact is larger than you might think. Each email takes electricity to type, and to send through the network. There's then the energy used by large data centres to store emails in inboxes. In 2019 293.6 billion emails were sent each day globally. The carbon emissions produced by one year of global emailing is equivalent to an extra seven million cars on the roads.

Emails with attachments equate to around 50g CO2 emissions, whereas text only are around 4g.

What can I do to improve my email impact?

- Delete emails you no longer need
- Don't send unnecessary emails
- Delete spam emails before opening them (this will save on energy for downloading it)
- Unsubscribe from marketing emails that you don't read / don't want to receive
- Don't send unnecessary attachments.
- I for one should turn my laptop off each night too, rather than leaving it on standby!

Stewardship and Gift Aid

We thank the many members who regularly give and contribute financially to aid the continuation of the work of God in St Peter's.

No collection is taken during our services, and for those who would like to give by cash or cheque, there is a basket at the back of church and a card machine available in the hall. When required, a special box is available for Charity donations.

For those using Gift Aid Envelopes

We now use white envelopes printed ourselves and available at the back of church for donations that are Gift Aided. Currently we have 3 types of envelope for congregational members to use.

How to fill in St Peter's Gift Aid donation envelopes.

- 1. Numbered anonymous envelopes for general giving
- 2. Named envelopes for general giving
- Named envelopes for giving to a specific charity

When making donations via one of these 3 types of envelope please follow the following guidelines:

- If you donate via numbered anonymous envelopes then all that is needed is for you to write the amount offered on the envelope.
- If you donate using a General Fund or a Charity Collection envelope and have filled out a GA declaration form then all that is needed is for you to write the amount offered and your name on the envelope.
- If you donate using a General Fund or a Charity Collection envelope and have NOT filled out a GA declaration form but wish the sum donated to be eligible for GA please write the amount offered and fill out your contact details on the back of the envelope.

The gift aid system allows St Peter's to reclaim tax on almost all of these donations which adds significantly to our total giving and thank you to all who have filled out GA declaration forms for this purpose.

How to give by Standing Order or regular payment

Donations can also be made directly into 'St Peters Church' bank account.

Home thoughts from abroad

By the time you read this, we shall be back at St Peter's. Not St Peter's, Lutton Place, but St Peter's, Chantilly. This is an Anglican chaplaincy within the Diocese in Europe. Chantilly is a town of some 11,000 people, north-east of Paris, not far from Charles de Gaulle airport. The church has been here since 1863. It is a neo-Gothic building, very English in style, built on land gifted by the fabulously wealthy Duc D'Aumale; an anglophile who inherited a fortune from his uncle, the Prince de Condé.

Chantilly is well-known for lace-making and for horse-racing. It is twinned with Epsom. The church was originally built to serve the needs of expat English-speakers who worked in the horse-racing industry. At one time a significant proportion of the population was British. But the racing establishment of the Aga Khan is much diminished and there are fewer Brits than in the past.



Services are in English, based on *Common Worship* liturgy. Not very different from Lutton Place. But the hymnody is more contemporary; singing is from *Songs of Fellowship* vols. 1 and 2. Susie and I have been in Chantilly before; we were there for some 12 weeks in 2017, and I spent some 14 weeks there last year. The last permanent chaplain, 2017-2022, was psychologically fragile and it turned out to be an unfortunate appointment. In consequence the Sunday attendance and the church giving are substantially lower than 6 years ago. But the Church Council have produced a mission strategy, and the church are now advertising for a new chaplain and hope to be able to pay a full stipend. As with many congregations there are some tensions within the community: some members would like to stick with the *Book of Common Prayer* and traditional hymnody, while others would prefer to move towards a less Anglican, more contemporary, family-friendly form of worship.

There will be a Service of Christmas Readings and Carols on Sunday, December 17th. Which will be candle-lit. Some of the readings and some of the carols will be in French. The scratch choir will be organised by Michelle, a Brit, whose husband Vincent, a Frenchman, has recently been posted to head up Air France at Geneva Airport. And there will be a formal Midnight Service at 11.00pm on Christmas Eve and a shortened Family Communion service on Christmas Day. We would like to think of a

participatory Advent and Christmas Family Service on December 10th. But it is not clear whether there will be enough children and young people to make that possible.

Craig and the little girls, Amelia and Eloïse, will join us in Chantilly over Christmas. Which pleases Susie enormously. They and Joanna came for a weekend when we were in



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Chantilly 6 years ago. Amelia is hoping that we will have lunch in Paris, in *Chez Janou*, during their visit. "*I always eat there when I'm in Paris*", she says!

And with Christmas approaching, a few goodies like chocolate, Christmas treats or nuts would be an added treat.
