

As the new academic year starts at the university, so we have entered a season of new ventures at St Peter's. Our first night was greatly enjoyed by all who went, and it was wonderful that, along with Adam, a number of people played/sang and participated!



# **Annual General Meeting**

Sunday 26th October, c. 12.15pm, following the 10.45am service

Our Annual General Meeting will take place on Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> October 2025 after the 10.45am service. The meeting will commence in the church hall at around 12.15pm, following the 10.45am service, and will be chaired by Nick. The main purpose of the meeting will be to receive the Annual Report and Accounts.

The business of the meeting will also include: the election of four constituent members of the congregation to act as members of the Vestry; the election of a Lay Representative, Alternate Lay Representative; and the appointment of an independent examiner (to audit the annual accounts).

The meeting will also deal with any other competent business, notice of which should be lodged with myself or Nick prior to the meeting.

The names of all candidates seeking election to the Vestry, as Lay or Alternative representatives, together with their proposers and seconders, should be lodged with myself or Nick prior to the meeting, and in any event no later than midday Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> October. I'm happy to receive nominations for all positions electronically – please email me via the office if you wish to receive a nomination form by email. Forms will also be available from the back of church.

As required, copies of the Annual Report and Accounts will be available to view prior to the AGM. We aim to have them ready for distribution on 12<sup>th</sup> October 2025. Also available from that date will be copies of a draft minute of last year's AGM.

Please do not hesitate to contact me directly, or via the office, if you have any queries on arrangements for the AGM.

- Community issues & connections
- Relationships with the national Church

# **Funding for the Roof Repairs**

St Peter's is grateful to the three funders who have offered to help with the cost of replacing rotten roof timbers.

National Churches Trust, Wolfson Foundation and the Provincial Grants fund have all stepped up to help us pay for vital repairs to the church roof.

A few years ago the joint between the roof and the tower let water in. This was enough to set off a case of dry rot. Although the leak was quickly and easily patched, cutting out the rotten timbers is a more complicated job. Mary Thorburn Ltd was appointed lead contractor following a competitive tender process.

As you can see there is scaffolding inside and outside the church. On the underside, the joiner has removed the old timbers and replaced with matching Douglas Fir. The new wood is very blonde compared to the 165-year-old stained boards and joists. Outside, the roofers have rebuilt the lead gutter to throw water off at that tight inaccessible spot. They have re-laid the slates, including the distinctive band of fish tails.

Now the new timbers need to settle down before they are stained and stencilled to match the existing daisy design on the underside of the roof.



As part of our National Churches Trust grant, we need to ensure the building is open to members of the public in addition to regular services. Sheila, Nick and Becky have started a weekly children's music class in church.

In addition, we have always welcomed anyone who would like to look round the church and we now have signage outside to encourage visitors.

## Saint Ninian Declaration

On 16<sup>th</sup> September a historic declaration of friendship between the Scottish Episcopal Church and the Catholic Church in Scotland was signed in Edinburgh, allowing them to work more closely together in future.

The declaration supports a deepening relationship between the two denominations, making greater co-operation possible while acknowledging that there are differences between the two churches. It was signed by Archbishop Leo Cushley on behalf of the Conference of Bishops of the Catholic Church in Scotland and by the Most Rev Mark Strange, Bishop of Moray, Ross & Caithness and Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church.

Joint signings took place at Edinburgh's two 'St Mary's' cathedrals, first at St Mary's Catholic Cathedral in York Place, and then at St Mary's Episcopal Cathedral in Palmerston Place. The signing during Choral Evensong at St Mary's Episcopal Cathedral can be watched again here.

Archbishop Leo Cushley said: "This declaration is not only for us, but for the people of Scotland whom we are called to serve. By deepening the friendship, we strengthen our common witness to the Gospel in a world that longs for hope and reconciliation. True friendship does not demand uniformity, but grows through honesty, trust, and love.

"As we sign this declaration, we are saying to our people: let us walk together as brothers and sisters in Christ. Let our unity in Christ be a sign of God's love for all. May this moment encourage us to look outward, shoulder to shoulder, as friends and partners in mission."

Bishop Mark Strange said: "Through this act we in the Scottish Episcopal and Roman Catholic Churches are committing to walk forward together as friends, on the same journey of faith that Ninian started over a thousand years ago. It gives us an opportunity to focus on what we share, and to trust that Christ calls us all to listen, to learn, and to serve this land as descendants of Ninian, side by side." The signing follows the strengthening of links between Scotland's three largest Christian denominations in recent years, through the Saint Andrew Declaration between the Church of Scotland and the Scottish Episcopal Church (2021), and the St Margaret Declaration between the Church of Scotland and the Catholic Church in Scotland (2022).

# Tram network: Granton to RIE extension & Public consultation by Christine B.

Several months ago Anna highlighted the consideration being given by planners as to whether the tram extension to Granton should include the Roseburn Path, formerly a rail route. It's a wildlife corridor and much loved space for families, walkers, runners and cyclists. At the same time, the tram network is a valuable asset to sustainable travel in our city, reducing the need for cars, and the plan includes provision for a path alongside the proposed route.

Other options present difficulties in terms of engineering and cost - such as building a new bridge near the Dean Bridge (the existing bridge is not strong enough). And that's before anyone has agreed who should pick up the bill!

The public consultation about the Granton extension is open until 17<sup>th</sup> November 2025: you can find it with links to the three main sections of the proposed new route under consideration here:

Residents can also give their views at in-person drop-in sessions. Details of these sessions can be found on the Consultation Hub. We, the people of Edinburgh, are strongly encouraged to make our voices heard.

**Section 1** Granton to the city centre.

Section 2 City centre to BioQuarter and Royal Infirmary.

This part of the proposed route would affect St Peter's. It would begin at Princes Street, cross the North Bridge, and run through Nicolson Street, Newington and on to Cameron Toll, then out towards the BioQuarter and the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh.

Section 3 Potential extensions to Midlothian and East Lothian.

Also required are socks, and underwear, ideally new, but clean is acceptable. Anything that can't be used will be recycled.

# In Memory...

## Professor J. Michael Rotter 31<sup>st</sup> October 1948 - 9<sup>th</sup> August 2025

Nick writes;

It was a privilege to lead the funeral and thanksgiving services for Michael on 3<sup>rd</sup> September at St Peter's. I always appreciated Michael's friendliness,



approachability and sense of humour. He was one of those very rare people who whilst being very intelligent and being the world's leading expert in his field, was always interested in what others thought and had to say. 
